EUGENE TEATS. MINER, IS DEAD

He Arrived Here as a Boy With Wagon Train In 1856.

Eugene H. Teats, pioneer, miner, traveler and teller of early-day tales, died Sunday at his home, 745 Lufay. ette street. He was 12 years old.

Eugene Teats, as a f-year-old boy, arrived in Denver with a wagon train, and joined his father, Robert H. Tenty, proprietor of the old Ele-



streets. That was in 1856. He came west from Mt. Clemens, Mich., where he was born, May 2, 1847.

As Engens Tosts became older, he acquired interest in mines through the state. He was married in George-teen, Cole. His wife, Mrs. Alice A. Teats, died here, Dec. 20, 1922.

OFTEN TRAVELED TO SOUTH AMERICA.

For many years Mr. Teats held extensive interests in a gold mining company in Dutch Guissa, and travcled between Denver and South America, sometimes making two teins a year. He gave up this in-terest several years ago, because of III houlth.

The old Eliphant corral, in the wegon train days, was the starting point and the goal of the bull whackers and mule skinners, and the as-sembly place of cowboys, miners, gamblers, gunnen, Indians and ad-venturers. Young Tests learned to know them all. He leved to tell stories of his beybood here—stories that were vivid word pictures drawn from youthful memories of an almeet camera-like clarity.

Eugene Tents saw Con Oram and Enoch Davis fight their Beround prizefight here. His father was a second in the first formal duel fought in Denver.

DUELISTS PISTOLS LOADED WITH BLANKS,

An argument over treatment of a horse by a French restaurant keeper led to the duel between the Frenchman and Col. Ned Wynkoop. Neither duelist knew his pistol had been loaded with blanks.

Young Tests, 14 years old, rede Chief, the horse that raced Border Ituffian for the \$90,000 gold brick stake in 1861. Never before nor since was such a race cun in Colorado. The \$50,000 in the golddust bet by buckers of the two horses was proceed in an \$80,000 brick of solid gold, which hung in plain sight above the finish line. The course was on the old Mc-Nasser farm, where the Globe smelter stack now stands. Chief, with Tests up, won.

Tests up, won marviving Mr. Tests are two daughters, Miss Heley Tests and Mrs. Guy Ferrall, both of Denver; a brother, Frank, of Littleton; two granddaughters, Mrs. Robert Wynkoop, Densar, and Mrs. Hichard Upton, New York, and a great grandson, Richard Upton Jr., of New York.

The funeral will be from the Olinger martuary Wednesday at 11:30 a. m., followed by cremation at filterside cometery.
